According to the experts, the number of Christians in the United State that do not identify with any organized religion is growing, while 70 percent of catholic, in today's America, do not go to church. The reasons given are many but regardless, the truth is that a new trend is sweeping the country and it is not a happy trend. It seems like every week there is a new report of death and destruction. "Where was God when the shooting happened?" It seems a valid question that may go unanswered. But when everything seems lost, here comes a group of young high school students from a Catholic school in the Archdiocese of Hartford, CT to challenge experts and politicians alike.

In response to comments such as: "where was God" their response is simple: "We asked him to leave". We asked him to leave? How?

"A football player is glorified for drugs and immoral acts, but a football player talks about his faith and he is judged. In college, students are told to hide their faith

so that they do not offend anyone. They are also told that we should not be praying for the victims, and that prayers should be left for forgiveness."

So, the students of East Catholic High school, as Americans, decided to take a stand and stand for prayers:

"Pray for peace. Pray that God is allow back into our lives, without shame, pray for the victims, pray that we once again become one Nation under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all".

Booklets were given to us in our packets, Resource on Mercy, and Retreat on Mercy, can be found on the website, and Our Lady of Fatima Rosary. Handouts are available. Kathy Bonner did a presentation on Women Healing the Wounds.

Victoria, A large cardboard cut out, met us at the Door of the NCCW meeting room with a sign on her that read "NCCW Stands Against Domestic Violence" Copies were given to the DCCW Service Commission Chairman at our breakout session.

October was Domestic Violence Month we were asked try to do at least one thing in the program. A program is provided on the NCCW website so you have the tools to follow step by Step guide to help end Domestic Violence. An Example: In Sunrise Florida the Domestic Violence Awareness program for years: An announcement in the parish bulletin alerts parishioners that in two weeks they will be Outside the church doors usually on the 3rd Sunday of the month. Volunteers are there in full force at every entrance of the church with purple buckets for a collection to help "Lick Family Violence"—with every donation they handout a lollipop. After hearing Kathy Bonners program presentation they will hand out the lollipops to the children and to the parents they will be handing a band aid with the works, Help Heal the Wounds

We wrote on band-aids and taped them together and made a chain spread across the front and down the sides of the room. Money's they collect is split between their local community and parishes.

Mentoring Women embracing Women – a packet was made available to us. Also LTD Team provided information.

Ex: When you meet a new member at a meeting, make a note of something personal she shared with you and mention it in conversation at your next meeting. Since my election as Second Vice-President I have attended the summer Post-Convention Board Meeting, the Fall Workshop and the National Council of Catholic Women's Annual Convention. The theme for the convention was Living the Joy of the Gospel. There were many great speakers throughout the four-day convention. Cathy asked me to report on the talks given by the keynote speakers from Thursday, Friday and Saturday. I know it seems long, but the speakers were very-very good and I just had couldn't help but share the great information with everyone. Please enjoy.

Beginning with the keynote speaker on Thursday, Mary Rice Hasson. She is an author, editor and speaker on Catholicism, culture, women, sexual morals and family life. We are thriving in our culture, but the challenge is in how to be a woman in our society. Society tells us that women are the same as men and that our identity of motherhood gets in the way of living our lives as women – both statements are untrue. We are created equally in the image and likeness of God, but sexual difference is real – we are not the same as men and our sexual identities are not the same. The fulfillment of our lives is not something we demand, but rather it comes to us when we are giving and serving God. When we work together, we accomplish so much more than we ever could on our own -1+1=3.

Living the Joy of the Gospel. The Gospel talks about joy, but what is it and how do we get it. Is it living with a smile on your face or living a virtuous life without bumps in the road? No. Joy is when Faith, Hope and Love come together. In John 15:11, Jesus said: "I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and your joy may be complete".

First - Faith - St. Mother Theresa's life was not without discord, but she persisted, knowing and trusting in her faith that God would be there. Her sense of joy was her faith. To fully live our faith as St. Mother Theresa did is the give your life to God and say "Your will be done". To increase our faith we need to sit quietly and spend time with God. If there are people in your life that are struggling with their faith, pray for them and let God do His work.

Next - Hope – For an increase in hope, pray the Stations of the Cross – walk with Jesus. When she was pregnant with her sixth child, she was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis, MS. She struggled with taking the medication fearing for the safety of her child. She learned to trust and hope when she came to the realization that God's love for her son was greater than her love for him.

And finally - Love – the last component for joy is love. Mary Rice Hasson gave an example of a woman whose husband

was unfaithful. She thought she had worked through her pain and had forgiven him. He got sick and called her asking to come home. She found that she still had love for him and had to say yes. Is there someone in our lives that we need to reach out to and forgive? When we realize the wellspring of God's love, how can we not also forgive?

With Faith, hope and love together, we will find Joy.

The keynote speaker on Friday morning was Stacy Thomlinson a missionary currently serving in Rwanda. In 1981, Mary appeared to the children in Kibeho in Rwanda, Africa. She danced with them. During the visions, she recommended that people pray the Chaplet of the Seven Sorrows to obtain repentance. Stacy read a book on the apparitions at Kibeho that lead to her conversion to Catholicism.

Her story began in the same manner as one of the stories from the previous speaker. She was married in college. 18 months after they were married, he was unfaithful. God loves us through the pain. She came to the understanding that although she hated what he did, she loved him. She was a FOCUS missionary – Fellowship of Catholic University Students. She is a trained nurse and germs are her thing. While living in the FOCUS community house, she chose to live in the bedroom that was located in the basement. Although it was a dark basement, it had one great thing - it had its own bathroom with a shower, perfect for a germaphobe. One morning she heard someone open the basement door, come down the stairs and go into her bathroom. You know in the cartoons where they have an angel sitting on one shoulder and the devil on the other. That was the conflicted thoughts she experienced. Someone had gotten into her shower; they were going to use her soap; she was going to have to clean-up after them. Then she thought, you didn't see who went in there. What if it is Jesus? Then she thought – how clean was my bathroom; clean enough for Jesus? Of course, she thought, you know it isn't Jesus; it's one of your roommates; but why not have the same reaction as if it was Jesus? When you have a guest in your home, you have God in your home. Jesus is just as real today as he was 2000 years ago. He is here in the power of the Holy Spirit. She wants to be a witness that God is calling us to spend just five minutes a day with Him, reading His word, talking to Him or just being still.

Jesus is fully God and fully human. Emmanuel – God with us or God with you. Jesus fully had the power to perform miracles, but He never did; He called on God, His father, to perform the miracles. As in John 15:5 without God, you can do nothing.

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Another story she told was about being a nurse in the adult oncology floor. The only child that she ever treated was Cameron, a three-year-old little girl. She had a brain tumor with 100% mortality rate. Her mom said someone has to be the first to survive. Cameron had to go to the adult floor so the pediatric nurses could learn how to access her port. Cameron was not the first to survive. Her mom asked how God could allow this, she was so innocent, she was a baby, and she brought so much joy to our lives. Stacy wasn't sure what to say to the grieving mother, knowing it was too soon, she prayed about what to say. Recently God told her, you know I lost a child too, He suffered, He was bruised and broken, and I asked Him to do it. I asked Him to go through this pain because I love you. So maybe what I am trying to show Cameron's mom is how much I love her. That's what I have done for her; that's what He has done for us.

The keynote speaker on Saturday morning was Dale Recinella, author, spiritual counselor and Catholic lay chaplain in Florida's prisons. He is a certified and appointed Chaplain under the USCCB as a death Chaplain. He has been the spiritual advisor at executions and his wife, Susan, a clinical psychologist, makes herself available to the condemned's family and loved ones. His talk was entitled "Can the Joy of the Gospel Penetrate the Darkness of our Prisons and Death Rows?" He has ministered to approximately 400 men on Florida's death row and approximately 2,000 men in Florida's long-term solitary confinement. He and his wife have also ministered to the families and loved ones of murder

victims and they are there to minister to the staff. Even at the darkest in prison, the Joy of the Gospel can penetrate.

How do we minister to the families of those in prison? His friend found a program and asked him to help him get it in their parish. They went to the parish council meeting and the pastor said there wouldn't be anyone at their program, because there is no one in the parish with a family member in prison; that he could not publish it outside the church; and that the church would not fund the 12-week program. Week 1 - two women showed-up; week 2 - six more attended, so they re-did session 1; week 3 - ten more people were there; each week more showed-up. No one knew the others had a family member in prison; they don't talk about it.

Those that are victims of a crime have a stigma. For example, there must have been something you did wrong that caused your child to be murdered. It is a walk of isolation, a silent suffering. When reaching out to those with loved ones in prison, be sure to include those that have been a victim or has a family member that was a victim.

When ministering to those in prison, don't forget the staff. The prison does not have air conditioning; the guards get spit on or bitten by infected inmates and have feces or infected blood thrown at them. You may be the only Catholic they encounter. You may be the only one who worries about their safety and well-being.

Next year the National Convention will be in Pittsburgh.

BVF cards

Please use the Bishop's Vocation Fund cards. The \$10 donation for each card helps educate our seminarians. The seminarians pray for the person named on the card, who is also remembered in the masses at St. John Vianney and St. Vincent DePaul Seminaries. We have memorial, get well, and celebration cards. Encourage your affiliation to use them; encourage your members to use them personally. Every affiliate should have cards so that they are easily available to its members.

PENNIES FOR PRIESTS

Encourage your affiliations, your parish schools, your families to have their own "Pennies for Priests" jar. Tell them when they get a penny, to say a prayer for vocations or for a particular priest, deacon, or religious, and put the penny in the jar. Never put money in the jar without saying a prayer for each coin deposited. Putting the money in the jar is a reminder to pray for vocations; seeing the amount of money in the jar increase serves as a visual tool to show how many prayers have been offered for vocations. Affiliates send the money they've collected to the DCCW treasurer before convention to be given to the Bishop for seminarian support. Families or parish schools may wish to use their penny jar money to support vocations in a different way, although the DCCW will be happy to receive it.
